## Work environment & locations

Pediatric therapists work in hospitals, child development centres and schools throughout the Province of British Columbia.

These positions are funded through the Ministry of Health, Ministry of Children and Family Development (MCFD) and Ministry of Education.

Pediatric therapists work in urban, rural and remote locations and are often part of multi-disciplinary teams that include Occupational Therapists, Physiotherapists, Speech-Language Pathologists, as well as teachers, nurses and physicians.

## Pediatric Speech-Language Pathologists (SLPs)

Pediatric Speech-Language Pathologists help children acquire the skills they need to effectively communicate. They evaluate, diagnose, and treat speech, language, communication, and swallowing disorders. They often work with children to enhance speech, language and/or cognitive development in children with Autism spectrum disorders, developmental delay, feeding disorders and pediatric traumatic brain injury.

### **Pediatric Physiotherapists (PTs)**

Pediatric Physiotherapists work with children affected by disease, injury, or disability to help them preserve, restore or enhance movement and physical function. They use therapeutic exercise, physical modalities, assistive devices, patient education and training to help children acquire the gross motor skills (walk, run, jump) they require to explore their environment and/or improve their day-to-day physical functioning.
